
Infringement or Fair Use

- Many generative AI tools are trained on enormous quantities (sometimes billions)
 of items protected by IP. There are several ongoing legal disputes alleging that
 the scraping and use of these works to train AI, the trained AI models, and their
 outputs are IP infringements.
- In response, Generative AI companies say the lawsuits are without merit because their business strategies leverage "fair use" to train their AI models.
